Morpeth History.

Morpeth, New South Wales, boasts a rich history as a significant river port in the Hunter Valley during the 19th century. Originally known as Green Hills, it was renamed Morpeth in 1834, after a town in Northumberland, England. The town's prosperity stemmed from its strategic location on the Hunter River, facilitating trade with Sydney and surrounding regions.

Edward Charles Close: Selected the land and developed the town as a river port. **William Arnott**: Established a bakery in Swan Street that later became the famous Arnott's Biscuits.

Caleb Soul: Owned Taylors Bond Store and later founded Soul Pattinson.

Industries: Morpeth was home to various industries, including bakeries, bond stores, foundries, and even soap works.

Today:

Morpeth is a well-preserved historic town, attracting visitors with its heritage buildings, boutique shops, and cafes.

The Morpeth Heritage Walk allows visitors to explore the town's significant sites and learn about its history.

Morpeth Museum, located in the former courthouse, showcases the town's rich past.
